- **Thailand:** 16.6 (+0.79 worsening since 2018) Female 5.5 Male 28.2

- **Suicide is the third leading cause of death among adolescents in the country [Thailand].** According to the 2021 Global School-based Student Health Survey, 17.6 per cent of adolescents aged 13–17 had recently seriously considered suicide.

### Mental health workers per 100,000

- **Global:** 13.5
- **South East Asia Region:** 4
- **Thailand:** 10.7

### Nurses working in mental health per 100,000

- **Global:** 4.1
- **South East Asia Region:** 0.4
- **Thailand:** 7.2

### Psychiatrists\* per 100,000

- **Global:** 1.5
- **South East Asia Region:** 0.5
- **Thailand:** 1.2

### Psychologists\*\* per 100,000

- **Global:** 2
- **South East Asia Region:** 0.2
- **Thailand:** 0.6

#### NOTES:

\*Psychiatrist: A medical doctor who has had at least two years of postgraduate training in psychiatry at a recognized teaching institution. May have training in any sub-specialty of psychiatry.

\*\*Psychologist: A professional who has completed formal training in psychology at a recognized, university-level school for a diploma or degree in psychology. For the Mental Health Atlas, information was sought only on psychologists working in mental health care.
